## **Ready To Compete?**

Our club's International Speech Contest event will be at our next regular meeting time - 6pm on Thursday, February 16th, at the Public Health Building in room 119C. There's still plenty of time to sign up to give a speech - it doesn't have to be a manual speech (unless you want project credit,) and it can be on any subject.

The only requirements for entry are other to be a current member of the City of Columbus Toastmasters Club (in Distrigood standing,) and to have Colur completed six manual speeches. If conter you're one or two shy of the goal, other you may still be able to get those Centre speeches in, by visiting other clubs. again have relatively few members, and cham may be open to a last-minute comp participant. Contact Liz if you'd like level. more information on them.

Are you curious about what a Toastmaster's speech competition is like? Don't worry too much - it's an awful lot like a regular meeting. The main difference is that instead of evaluations being given by a single evaluator for each speech, and "Best Speech" awards being given out on the basis of a vote amongst those in the audience, the speeches are all evaluated by the same set of judges, who collectively determine who has won.

The other important difference is that the winner of the International Speech Contest at the club level will be qualified to compete at the Area level, with members from the other clubs in Area 16: Down on Third, Children's Hospital, Brewery District, Camp Sherman, and City of Columbus. The winner of the Area contest competes against all the other Central Division winners; the Central Division winner competes against all the other District 40 winners, and so on. Every world champion, every year, starts off by competing at the individual club

Don't be worried about not being "good enough" or "experienced enough" to compete - if you've got your six speeches in, you're ready. The point is to have fun, to get some valuable experience, and maybe to show off what you've learned so far. Give it a shot! You have nothing to lose but your fear.

#### Grammar Tip

"In" Versus "Into"

"In" indicates where something is right now. "Into" implies movement from one place to another place.

So:

"She screamed at the kids to get into the house before she counted to ten, or they'd spend the rest of the week sitting <u>in</u> their rooms with no TV or internet."

#### **Speaking Tip**

Know your audience! It matters whether you're speaking to a crowd of college students on Spring Break or the Mayor's staff meeting, right? Well, the more subtle differences matter a lot, too. Consider the education level, day to day activities, personal interests, likely individual experiences, and cultural nuances both when deciding on your topic and arranging your presentation. And be sure to look the part, too!

As a public speaker, your voice is your instrument - and like the violinist or drummer, you must practice with it to achieve the sounds you want to make, when you want to make them. Your

voice is an instrument whose sound If you want to talk with them on can be described in many ways: pitch, tone, volume, speed, and so on.

To improve your vocal control this week, try some tongue twisters:

"I saw Susie sitting in a shoe shine shop. Where she sits she shines, and where she shines she sits."

"Denise sees the fleece, Denise sees the fleas. At least Denise could sneeze and feed and freeze the fleas."

"How many cookies could a good cook cook, if a good cook could cook cookies? A good cook could cook as much cookies as a good cook who could cook cookies."
